



Do you have a complaint about the enforcement of COVID-19 restrictions by ACT Policing?

The Australian Federal Police (including ACT Policing) has increased responsibilities to ensure that the community complies with health directions designed to stop the spread of COVID-19 within the community. This factsheet explains who you can complain to if you have concerns about an interaction that you had with the police about these directions.

How can I make a complaint?

If you have a complaint about the AFP (including ACT Policing), you should make your complaint directly to the <u>AFP's Professional Standards Unit</u> using its <u>online complaint form</u>. The AFP can also be contacted by phone on **(02) 5127 2020.**

If you are not satisfied with the AFP's response to your complaint or you feel uncomfortable, or unable, to approach the AFP directly, you can contact the ACT Ombudsman using <u>our complaint form</u>. If you don't have internet access, you can call us on **(02) 6276 3773** (option 2) between 9am and 12pm Monday-Friday (AEST).

How do I know what directions are in place?

There are nine ACT public health directions currently in place for the COVID-19 crisis—see: <u>covid19.act.gov.au</u>. This includes a <u>direction</u> which outlines how many people are allowed to gather together, and where.

Important:

- COVID-19 arrangements in the ACT may change quickly.
 - You should always check the above website to ensure you have the most accurate and up to date information about what you can and can't do.
 - You can also call the ACT COVID hotline on (02) 6207 7244 (8am-8pm, 7 days a week).
- These directions are different to what applies in NSW see: nsw.gov.au/covid-19.

How are these directions being enforced?

You need to comply with these directions, unless you have a reasonable excuse. ACT Policing can take reasonable steps to ensure that you do so. This includes requesting proof of identification if you are not complying, issuing warnings and on-the-spot fines of \$1,000 for an individual and \$5,000 for a corporation.

Greater penalties may apply if you are prosecuted in court for breaching a public health emergency direction, with a maximum penalty of \$8,000 for an individual.

Important:

- ACT Policing has also advised that people who cough or spit on emergency service workers or members of the community during the COVID-19 crisis will be charged with assault.
- The police will be seeking to maintain a 1.5m distance where practicable when interacting with the public and will wear protective equipment where there are concerns that there is a health risk to them, or the public.
